Lonna Hooks, Executive Director of the North Capitol Main Street program learned at 4 pm on Nov. 24<sup>th</sup>, the day before Thanksgiving, that her North Capitol Main Street's clean team was scheduled to be eliminated in Mayor Fenty's Budget Gap Closing bill now in front of City Council. The Gap Closing Bill will be voted on tomorrow, Tuesday, Dec. 7. The three-member Clean Team is part of the Ready, Willing and Working program providing street cleaning and 'Ambassador' services in the North Capitol Main street Area and also provides supplemental cleaning services on Barracks Row, the 8<sup>th</sup> between Pennsylvania Ave and M St. SE.

"The Clean Team services are at the heart of the North Capitol Main Street program," said Ms. Hooks. "One of the most basic services we provide is to make our city streets litter-free and secure.
